Our teachers are trained in the 4MAT model of teaching, a natural cycle for delivering instruction to all types of learners. It's a statistical fact—our students are uniquely successful. They are academically prepared, college bound, and are clear thinkers who are motivated to achieve.

Our strong academic curriculum, put in place by the North American Division and the Southern Union Adventist EDGE initiative, delivers **GREAT** education by being:

- **God-centered**- SDA principles are integrated with learning to anchor students in a relationship with God and prepare them for a joyful life of service. With common learning as its core, we also educate our children and youth in terms of their physical, spiritual, mental, and service to the community and world.
- **Results-oriented**- Measurable goals are established and results are assessed to assure that student and teacher performance is cultivated to the highest possible level and teaching strategies are continually refined. Adventist education has always placed a premium on academic quality and the data speaks for itself. Of North American graduates of Adventist schools, more than 85% pursue higher education, well above the national norm with 80% completing a college degree.
- **Environment that is safe and nurturing**- Our educators deliver results by meeting individual learning needs in a nurturing environment. With the teacher as a servant-leader/coach, students master relevant, meaningful concepts in a safe and nurturing environment.
- **Aligned with Adventist and National Standards**- The curriculum for the SDA educational system provides learning experiences that meet not only the general needs, but also the specialized needs related to the unique abilities, interests, and expectations of each learner. Content standards were designed to encourage the highest achievement of every student, by defining the knowledge concepts, and skills that students should acquire at each grade level. At the secondary level, the curriculum is designed to serve a wide range of interests and abilities, each meeting rigorous national standards, providing critical preparation for college and the best possible preparation for future success.

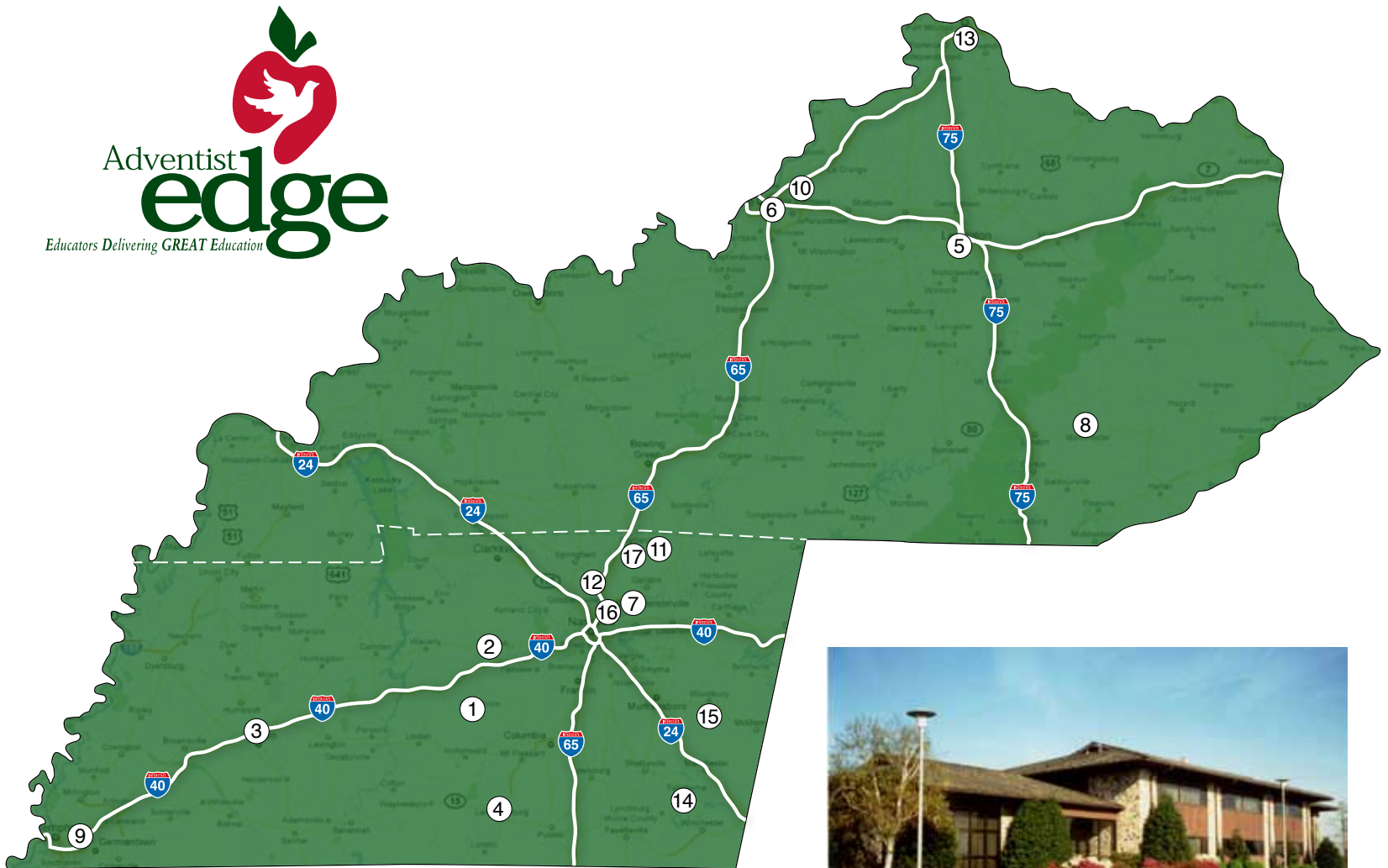
